#### FIRST CANCELLATIONS - INARAJAN AND MERIZO

Service to inarajan and Merizo began on August 29, 1930. On Jan. 9, 1931, Gov. Bradley ordered that a special canceller be obtained for these villages. "Defiance" dater stamps were ordered from Manila.

#### THE FOURTH GUAM GUARD MAIL ISSUE

The 1930 population of Merizo Village and its rural area was 1101, of which only 460 were adults and 21.5% of them were illiterate.



The 1930 population of Inarajan Village and its rural area was 1176, of which 498 were adults, again 21.5% illiterate.

The double cancellations are Mar. 8, 1931 and Mar. 11, 1930. Obviously someone made an error in changing the date in the canceller.


#### THE LAST DAY OF THE GUAM GUARD MAIL



Pan American Airways did not have a mail contract with the U. S. Post Office for flying mail over the Pacific. Arrangements were made whereby the carrier could fly covers that were franked with a 6¢ stamp (air mail rate), to which Pan Am was permitted to add a \$1.00 service fee. Upon reaching the planes destination, the covers could be placed in the official mail, providing another stamp was added.

The Round Trip covers required three stamps. Pan Am was permitted to charge a \$2.00 service fee for the Round Trip covers. Pan Am also provided cachets for covers flown in each direction.



#### WAR COVERS

The Marines landed on Guam on 21 July 1944. By 10 August 1944, Guam was fully occupied by the Americans.

The cancellation, APO 77, was the first one used during the re-capture of Guam. It was used from 1 Aug. to 22 Oct. 1944.

This cover was mailed on August 1st while the heavy fighting was in progress. The back of the cover has two machine cancellations by the U. S. Army Postal Service dated August 5 and August 10, 1944.

#### WAR COVERS

APO 246 was General Headquarters, U. S. Army Air Corps on Guam. APO 953 was Wheeler Field, Hawaii

5.0 U.S. Navy Station Ships at Guam

Over the years since 1899, the U.S. Navy has stationed a number of ships at Guam for extended periods. These ships provided services, supplies, etc., to other Navy activities and to visiting transient Navy ships that stopped at Guam. In Naval terminology these service vessels are referred to as "Station Ships."

Probably the most famous of these ships was the USS Gold Star, which was stationed at Guam from 1924 until 1941. Over the years, numerous cancels were recorded from the Gold Star with various references to Guam between their killer bars (see Appendix A).

A listing of the different U.S. Navy ships that have served at Guam in the capacity of Station Ships are listed below. Especial thanks are due Dr. R.L. Haddock of Guam for searching through the old *Governor's Annual Reports* for information on some of these early ships. Covers and cancellations from these ships are collected as collateral material relating to Guam and are considered a part of Guam's postal history.

5.8 USS Penguin (AM-33) (1930 to December 8, 1941) The USS Penguin had come to Guam about 1930 and was at Guam off and on from that date. She shared the duties of Station Ship at Guam with the USS Gold Star when the latter was off on its periodic trips. On November 17, 1941, the ill-fated Penguin relieved the Gold Star as Station Ship, but this tour of duty was very short-lived as the Penguin was sunk at Guam in the Japanese air raid on December 8, 1941. Numerous cancels also exist from this ship's post office, reflecting the ship's presence at Guam in the 1930's (see Appendix A).
