GENERAL REMARKS.

GENERAL REMARKS.

The general market has exhibited only a moderate degree of activity during the past week. Prices had previously advanced to such a high point for nearly every leading article, but more particularly for Cotton, Sugar and Molasses, that buyers have been unwilling to go on at the ruling rates, preferring to stand aloof for a time and await further developments. In our leading staple, however, a material advance in New York has revived the demand. In other articles, the upward tendency of gold, which is calculated to carry with it an advance in prices of all comodities, has caused holders to be even more stringent in their pretensions, but buyers have continued to stand aloof and shown little or no disposition to renew the movement with any degree of spirit. Our Gold market, on the other hand, having received an additional stimulus from the rise in Wall Street, has been unusually excited, and has further advanced about 15 % cent. on last week's quotations. Foreign Exchange also has improved in a corresponding degree, Sterling having risen to 220, that is, 120 % et. premium, and Francs to 2.60 per dollar.

The additional regulations of trade with insurrectionary States, prescribed by the U.S. Treasury Department under date of January 26, were calculated to facilitate commercial intercourse across the lines and increase our supplies of Cotton, but not being in force in the several military departments, until promulgated by their respective Commanding Generals, have not hitherto taken effect in the Department of the Gulf. They have now, however, been officially promulgated, by General Orders dated at Alexandria April 29. Had this been done at an earlier period it might have materially increased our receipts of Cotton, and even at this late period it is anticipated that it will augment our supplies, but to what extent remains to be seen. The entire capital of the First National Bank of New Orleans has now been paid up, and at a recent public sale its stock brought a premium of 6 % cent. The increase i

We have no change to notice with regard to our currency. Legal Tender notes command a premium of from 2 @ 4 % cent. over City Treasury notes which constitute the bulk of our local circulation. Specie, Exchange, Cotton, Sugar, Molasses, and some few other articles are mostly sold for legal tender notes, but in our general trade, currency is the medium of exchange, and sellers of Western produce are compelled to receive it in payment from their customers, who have no other funds. Hence, when they are instructed to invest the proceeds of sales in Sugar &c., or in Exchange, they are compelled to pay the premium on legal tender notes with which to fill their orders or purchase
