
Dear Leopold,


The Confederacy had no large paper mills at the beginning of the war. The Federal blockade soon made paper a scarce commodity. With thousands of men separated from their families, the need to write was overwhelming. Even though Southern paper mills struggled to meet demand, families found creative ways to deal with the shortage. This included the use of old Federal stamped envelopes, captured Union Patriotics, and turning a previously used cover. Any clean sheet of paper such as wallpaper, ledger sheets, or notepaper could be fashioned into a cover. Adversity covers show the ingenuity of Southern families.


