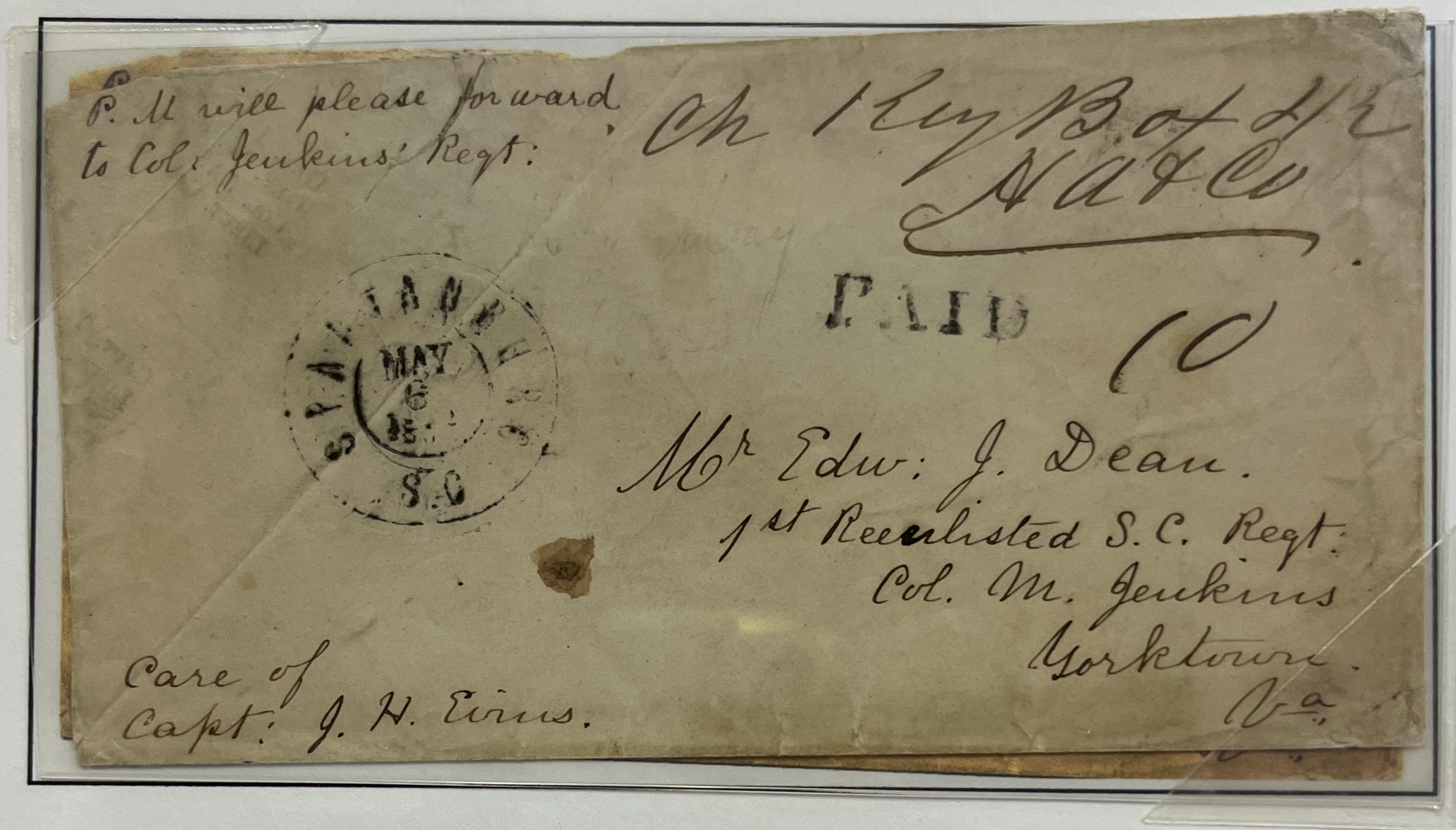

Adversity cover made from part of the Palmetto Sharp Shooter Regimental roster. Addressed to Mr. Edward J. Dean, 1st Reenlisted S.C. Regt., Col. M. Jenkins, YORKTOWN, Va. Care of Capt. J. H. Eirus. Manuscript notation: "P.M. will please forward to Col. Jenkins Regt." A part of the Dean Family correspondence. Ex-Kohn

Interesting notation on reverse. "Yesterday the 4th was a singularly cold gloomy day. We fear it was a day of battle, on which the sun veiled its face. It is now 9 o'clock A.M. (5th) pouring rain. If it clears up toward eve, we shall send for Mollie to spend a day night. My best respects to Messrs. W & R / kind remembrance to the Dr. Love to Henry from his wife, and all the family, white & black.

I have a long letter written, but send you this instead. I think it will be 10 cts to you. Lizzie will mail a letter at the same time-Friday 5th July '61

Edward J. Dean enlisted at Spartanburg on April 13, 1861 for one year by Capt. Joseph Walker. He was mustered in to Company K on June 14, 1861 and was accompanied by his slave Uncle Henry. He reenlisted for three years in April 1862. In Sept. 1862 he was transferred to Company D. He was captured at Petersburg, VA on July 30, 1864 and sent to Ft Delaware on August 11, 1864. He was paroled and released June 17, 1865.
