Grading and Condition

Superb Extraordinary item in the finest condition.

Extremely Fine Outstanding and exceptional quality.

Very Fine Choice, first-class condition.

Fine-Very Fine (F-VF) Stamp or cover in sound condition; if a stamp, it is slightly less well-centered than Very Fine but

better centered than Fine.

Fine Sound in all respects. Perforated stamps will have the designs clear of the perforations; the designs

of imperforate stamps will not be cut in to any significant degree.

Very Good (VG) Imperfect centering (stamps) or poor general appearance.

Any stamp faults such as a thin spot, tear, crease etc., will be described at all times. Postally used covers should be expected to have the normal degree of wear associated with them and this wear is not grounds for return. The grade of a cover is independent of the grade of the stamps on it. Covers from the famous Carroll-Hoy correspondence will normally have a small unobtrusive staple hole. In lots containing several items, degrees of condition denote the overwhelming average and examples above and below such condition can be expected.

Terms of Sale

Bidding

- I. All bids (whether by floor bidders, mail bidders, or telephone bidders) will have a premium of 18% added to the auction sale price.
- II. All bids are per lot as numbered in the catalog unless otherwise announced by the auctioneer at the time of sale. The right is reserved to withdraw any lot prior to sale, to divide a lot, or to group two or more lots, or to act on behalf of the seller. Schuyler Rumsey Philatelic Auctions, Inc. will execute bidding instructions on behalf of clients, but will not be responsible for any errors in the execution of such bids. Schuyler Rumsey Philatelic Auctions, Inc. is not liable for bidding errors related to live auction internet bidding and/or the loss of internet connection during the live auction.
- III. The highest bidder shall prevail; lots are sold at one increment over the second highest bid. Should any dispute arise between bidders, the decision of the auctioneer as to the successful bidder and the reoffering or resale of the lot under dispute shall rest entirely on the judgment of the auctioneer. The auctioneer shall regulate the bidding and reserve the right to refuse any bid believed by him not to be made in good faith.
- IV. Consignor has and retains the right to bid personally, or by his duly appointed agent, through the auctioneer, unless the sale is advertised and announced as one restricting such bidding by consignors or their agents.

Payments of Purchases

- V. FLOOR BIDDERS. Floor bidders shall furnish the auctioneer their names and addresses prior to bidding on any lot. The name and address of the buyer of each lot shall be registered with the auction house following the sale of each lot. Payment of the whole purchase price shall be made by the floor buyer in such manner as the auctioneer may determine. Special credit arrangements must be made prior to the sale.
- VI. MAIL BIDDERS. A successful mail bidder will be notified of lots purchased and must remit payment before the lots are sent. Auction bills are due and payable upon receipt of notification. If buyer's payment is not received within ten (10) days, Schuyler Rumsey Philatelic Auctions, Inc. may resell all lots without notice. Any and all losses incurred as a result of resale will be passed on to the defaulting buyer. Cost of postage, registration, etc. will be charged to buyer. Proof by the auctioneer of receipt of sending at the advised address shall constitute delivery.
- VII. DIRECT DRAFTS/TRANSFERS. A successful mail bidder known to us may contact our office at (415) 781-5127 for the information necessary to pay directly into the vendor bank account. Any additional charges resulting from processing payments by this method shall be borne by the buyer. Method of payment should be noted on the bid sheet.
- VIII. Title shall not pass to the buyer until full payment is received by Schuyler J. Rumsey Philatelic Auctions, Inc.
- IX. All of our lots are sold as genuine. Lots accompanied by recent (within 5 years of sale date) expert certificates are sold "as is" based on the description in the certificate. The aforementioned expertized lots may not be returned under any circumstances including those instances in which subsequent certificates yield conflicting opinions. The accepted authorities for U.S. stamps are the Philatelic Foundation (P.F.), the Philatelic Stamp Authentication and Grading, Inc. (P.S.A.G.) and the Professional Stamp Expertizing Committee (P.S.E.). In addition, a lot may not be returned because an expertising service grades a stamp lower than the grade stated in the description, or differs from the accompanying certificate.

- X. The Auctioneer must be notified within 5 business days from the date of the auction of any request to place a lot on extension for expertising. All extensions must be paid in full, in advance. There will be no exceptions and no lots may be returned under any circumstances if this term has not been strictly followed.
- XI. All lots on extension must be submitted for expertising by the auctioneer exclusively. Each lot is sold as genuine, except those described "as is", but when, in the opinion of a competent authority acceptable to Schuyler J. - XII. Any lot, description of which is incorrect, is returnable (A) within three (3) days of receipt and (B) if received by Schuyler J. 



The Omar Rodriguez Collection of Rare Colonial Covers



AN EXTREMELY RARE AND THE EARLIEST RECORDED POSTMARK OF MEXICO AND POSSIBLY THE SECOND EARLIEST IN THE AMERICAN CONTINENT. ONLY FOUR EXAMPLES OF THE VERACRUZ "CORREO MAYOR" COLONIAL HANDSTAMP ARE RECORDED AND ONLY TWO FROM THE 1730'S.


The postal system during colonial times started in 1580 as a private monopoly called "Correo Mayor". From 1604 on, this monopoly was auctioned by the Viceroy to the highest bidder, who would run it without investment or intervention from the state. This business was inheritable. The first handstamp postmark appeared on the 1730's in Veracruz. This system ended in 1766 when the monopoly reverted to the state.

There are 13 different "Correo Mayor" postmarks known with less than 40 covers recorded. So few exist because the service was limited to a handful of large cities, it was expensive, the majority of the population was illiterate and postmarks were applied only to the top cover in a bundle. Out of the four Veracruz postmarks, one of them may be an earlier cover however it's "1736" year date is mentioned as part of the text and not in the docketing so some experts believe this cover is undated. The only earlier handstamp postal markings in the American Continent are from New York (1707) and Lima (1735). Experts do not agree whether the 1707 New York marking was applied in England or in America.


















The rate of 3r seems below the normal registration rate of 1 peso, but this is undoubtedly a registered item. Maybe 10-15 registered fronts or covers exist during the colonial era.





3011 Marco, Franqueado En (Puebla), bold sharp strike of fancy framed handstamp (Yag-Bash PU50) on colonial folded letter to Puebla, dated October 15, 1806, manuscript "2" rate on reverse, Extremely Fine.











The "VV.F.7." mark on this cover is probably unique (Viva Fernando VII). These postmarks appeared in Latin America when the King Fernando 7th was held hostage by Napoleon. Although these political markings are more common in other Latin American countries they are very scarce in Mexico. THE UNIQUE COVER SENT FROM BAJA CALIFORNIA DURING THE COLONIAL PERIOD WITH EARLY TRANSIT AND VIVA FERNANDO $7^{\rm O}$ POSTMARKS.

Baja California was one of the most remote places during this period and could be only be reached by ship via San Blas and Acapulco. The "VV.F.7." mark on this cover is probably unique and was added in transit (Viva Fernando 7°). These postmarks appeared in Latin America when the King Fernando 7th was held hostage by Napoleon. Although these political markings are more common in other Latin American countries they are very scarce in Mexico. Probably because there was a strong anti-colonial sentiment and the war of Independence was being fought.



Carried along the Valladolid route which extended to the west of Valladolid, then a trade, religious and educational center.



3019 Mexico, Franco En (Mexico), blurred yet discernible handstamp on 1822 folded letter sheet from the personal correspondence of Agustin de Itubide, the First Emperor of Mexico to Guatemala, with perfect strike of fancy oval "Generalisimo Almirante" cachet handstamp used for only for a short period, Very Fine; with 2019 M.E.P.S.I. certificate.

AN EXTREMELY RARE COLONIAL COVER FROM THE FIRST EMPEROR OF MEXICO, AGUSTIN DE ITUBIDE, DURING HIS SHORT TIME AS GENERALISIMO ALMIRANTE.

Agustin de Itubide was crowned on July of the same year, with cachet used very briefly was when he had the title of Generalisimo Almirante. This cover with this cachet is most likely unique. He was in power very briefly and correspondences from the First Empire are very scarce. This being the most important cover.

The Omar Rodriguez Collection of the 1861 Hidalgo Issue

The 90% Complete 1861 Mexico Issue by District

INTRODUCTION

The second issue of Mexico appeared in 1861. It was printed locally in Mexico City and has the image of Miguel Hidalgo, the priest from the small town of Dolores who ignited the fight for Independence from Spain in 1810. The 1861 issue used the same plates as the First Issue of 1856 but with different colors of ink and paper. Not many collectors have noticed that the 1861 issue is more scarce than the 1856 issue because it lasted only 3 years while the First Issue lasted 5 years.

THIS COLLECTION

This 1861 collection formed by Omar Rodriguez over the last 35 years is a labor of love. It contains one superb single or multiple (occasionally two) of 90% of all surviving 1861 stamps issued in all surviving districts. These 250 different stamps (on and off cover) are of exceptional quality, often with large and jumbo margins hand-picked for beauty and rarity. The covers are often pristine entires with clear dates. These items were an important component of his First and Second Issue Hidalgos exhibit which won the 2004 USA Champion of Champions, and later on the International Grand Prix in 2006 in Washington. After these wins Omar's collection evolved into the in-depth study of the district overprints. Omar's new philatelic objective was to have at least one excellent stamp or cover for each of the 7 stamps in the set, from each of the 55 of the 59 districts and direct shipments where at least one stamp had survived. Unfortunately, no Baja California, Guadalupe Hidalgo, Huichapan or Rio Frio have ever been seen.

This collection has mostly complete sets of 52 districts out of 55 in existence. The only missing districts/direct shipments are Polotitlan, Tlalpam and Yguala. Only one stamp of each of those districts/direct shipments are known to exist. None have been in public auction in decades. By 2024 Omar's collection has 90% of the 278 different stamps/district combinations in existence. And now his entire 1861 collection is up for grabs here in 272 excellent lots.

This collection contains key district items from the four Mexico Hidalgos exhibits that have ever won the USA Champion of Champion top award: Dormer (1977), Paliafito (1987), Mazepa (2000) and Rodriguez (2004). Suffice it to say that Omar bought the Dormer's Champion of Champions exhibit intact and was a heavy bidder in the Paliafito's and Mazepa's auctions. So he had the opportunity to select the best district items from those collections.

Most items offered here have not been in the market for decades while Omar patiently built his exhibits. He was lucky. During those 35 years several other great collections were offered for sale. Apart from Dormer, Paliafito and Mazepa jewels, his 1861 collection includes items with impeccable provenance like Koenig, Schimmer, Schatzkes, Rosenthal, Langue, Broennimann, Speaker, Bob Jones, Gross Marnat, David Pietsch, Pietro Provera, and Manuel Iglesias. There are also legendary district rarities from Chapman, Larrañaga, Taylor, Wilson, Albert Quast, Richard Stevens, Ian Samuels, Boris Rubio, Heiman, Bannotti, John Bash and others. Almost all items have a MEPSI opinion.

THE SECOND ISSUE OF MEXICO

The Unique System of District Overprints

The stamps from the classic period of Mexico (1856-1884) have a distinct feature not present in any other country of the world: The District Overprint. The district overprint system originated in Mexico's unsafe roads due to a politically tumultuous and deadly civil war. Postal authorities were concerned about the safety of the stamps sent out from the central printing office in Mexico City to the 50+ postal districts. Banditos could have stolen shipments on the roads, causing havoc because stamps were like cash. As a consequence, a unique postal system was created to protect stamp income: Stamps were not valid for postage until they had safely arrived in the postal districts and a local overprint with the name of that district had been applied by hand to each individual stamp. This is a unique security feature among classic stamps of the world. This system remained in place for all regular issues until 1884.

The Two Different Colors of the 1861 High Values

Originally, the 1861 issue had 5 denominations, all in black ink but printed in different color paper: ½r on Buff, 1r on Green, 2r on Rose, 4r on Yellow and 8r on Brown. However, a few months into the issue two additional stamps in different inks were added to the set: a 4r Red on Yellow paper and the 8r Green on Brown paper. These new stamps were issued in small quantities and were initially sent to six large districts only (Guanajuato, Mexico, Morelia, Puebla, San Luis Potosi and Veracruz). Curiously enough, these stamps did not replace the original 4r and 8r, but were instead added to the set, making those districts sets of 7 stamps.

At the end of the issue, with the central post office in disarray, the small balance of these new colored stamps in stock was sent in small quantities to 16 other districts. All those are rarities.

There are no records explaining the reason for the introduction of those new colors or the breakdown of each type by ink color. An estimate, based on dated covers, was used by experts to break down the number of stamps of each color sent to each district. Estimates made by different experts not always coincided with each other. And some have been proven wrong.

The reason for the printing of these new colors is a big mystery. In a Mexicana article in the 1980's Roberto Liera put forward a plausible hypothesis based on early covers with illegal splits from large districts. The hypothesis is that larger districts were suspected of re-using uncancelled sections of used stamps as splits, creating postal frauds. So the central postmaster issued new colors of high denominations to catch any illegal splits. The red and green inks would be more visible to postal inspectors. This tactic probably worked since the splits from the 4r Red on Yellow and 8r Green on Brown stamps are extraordinarily rare.

Nobody knows why these six districts also continued to receive the regular colors as well. The philatelic fact is that these new stamps sent to 16 smaller districts are all great rarities. This auction has ALL the 22 different 4r Red on Yellow ever issued and 18 of the 19 different 8r Green on Brown. This is, without question, the largest offer ever of those rarities in individual lots.

Provisional Usages in 1867-1868

The 1861 issue was demonetized in 1864 and unsold stamps were returned to and burned at the central post office. After Maximilian's execution in 1867 the only stamps available were those of the Gothic issue which were exclusively for mail originating in Mexico City. The rest of the country was left to use Sello Negros (stampless mail). However, some postmasters found a small quantity of forgotten leftover stamps in their offices and used them during this period. These are extremely scarce. This collection contains six lots with some such rarities listed at the end of the catalogue. Among others, a unique registered front from Chiapas and a pristine high-rate cover from Puebla are available to the highest bidder. These have not been in the market for decades.


Splits: A Tool for Political Vengeance

Mexico splits in this early period were strictly the result of the politics of this era and therefore are an integral part in any Hidalgo collection. The Conservative party, which controlled the Mexico City post office, punished the Liberal districts by not sending them enough low denomination stamps. So they had no choice but to split higher denomination stamps. In rare cases combinations of splits or a split and a whole stamp were used to pay the rate. Although this collection focuses in whole stamps and does not count splits in the 90% completion rate, this auction has 22 lots with exceptional splits. Among them are: two octosects (only 4 are recorded in the Bash-Schimmer splits census), the only Mexico district bisect on a beautiful and legendary postal fraud cover from the Diligencias company, a surely unique 8r Black on Brown with a se-tenant bisect on cover front, and the only 8r Brown vertical bisect on cover, left out from cutting two quadrisects, one of each side - the only "center" bisect known.


INSIGHTS ABOUT DISTRICT OVERPRINTS

Relative rarity of District overprints.

Obviously, the size of the stamp shipments to the 50+ postal districts were based on their volume of mail. As a result, some stamps are more scarce than others. Table 1 describes the 4 reasons for differences in district sizes.



The size of issued stamps at the bottom of Table 1 helps classify districts as Common, Scarce or Rare. However, even in the Common or Scarce districts there are some rare stamps too because some denominations were not always sent to each district according to their relative size. The main cases of this are the 4r Red on Yellow (Scott #10) and 8r Green on Brown (Scott #12). All the direct shipments (explained below) are in the rare category. The complete list of 1861 districts, the general scarcity of their stamps and the economic activity of each district can be found in Table 2, which is organized by geographic area.



The Super Rare Direct Shipments

The term Direct Shipment is used for shipments to a small group of towns which were not districts but occasionally received stamps directly from Mexico City because of either 1) an emergency request when their district head office had run out of stamps (like San Martín Texmelucan or Polotitlán) or 2) because they were tiny towns under the authority of Mexico City (like Cuautitlan, Tepeji del Río or Texcoco). All stamps from Direct Shipments are rare because their issued quantities were very small. Since they were not districts they either don't bear any overprint (except for Cuautitlan), or do have a Mexico overprint but are canceled in these towns. Collectors consider them as additional "districts". Occasionally a few stamps missed the overprint by mistake. Those are not Direct Shipments and have only modest premiums over the regularly overprinted stamps. Only the Direct Shipments documented as such by Samuel Chapman from the old records he found and published in 1926 count as such. This collection has 16 lots with these rarities. This is the largest offering in a single auction in recent times.

It is important to mention that a handful of districts in 1861 seldom applied their overprint (e.g. Acapulco, Colima, Huajutla and Tulancingo). These are not direct shipments.

Stamps Needed to Complete the 1861 Set: 278 Stamps

Table 3 shows the breakdown of the 313 different issued stamps from all the 59 original districts and Direct Shipments for the 1861

However, not all have survived. A 2021 survey among district specialists, updated in 2024, shows that only 278 different stamps have survived from 1861 (in white cells) while 35 others (which were issued) had never been seen or reported by the core district specialists in the survey (yellow cells). The gray cells are stamps from Liera's estimated breakdown of the 4r and 8r value by color and district that never existed and were errors in his estimates. No district specialist in the survey have ever seen these.

Has Anyone Ever Owned A Complete Set?

No. No one has ever owned a complete set. And it is unlikely that anyone ever will as many of these stamps are unique. The real challenge for the collector is to get a high degree of completion. This collection being auctioned has a very high level of completion. It includes 250 of the 278 stamps known to exist, or 90%. It is undoubtedly one of the most complete specialized district collections ever formed. This is your rare opportunity to acquire several unique high-quality stamps which have not been in the market in decades.

The 1861 stamps were demonetized in 1864 with the Eagle issue. However a few districts used left overs in 1867 and 1868. These are very rare. Moreover, certified mail only exists in fronts because the front of the cover was cut in its destination and the addressee signed the back as proof of delivery. The front was then sent back to the office of origin and kept for 2 years and then destroyed. Only 15-25 have survived from this issue but probably 2-3 only from the provisional period. The rate should have been at least 8r but it only paid 4r. Most likely because it was a judiciary wrapper and the Comitan postmaster miscalculated the rate.







1899-1903 Aguilitas Superb Postal History Gold Medal Exhibit, offered intact (except for proofs offered separately); nine frames neatly mounted in 72 double pages with 200+ high quality postal history items (147 covers, 29 exceptional postal cards and 27 fronts with unique frankings (like the largest multiple of the 10c), considered tot be the best collection of this issue ever exhibited, contains 35 items with mixed frankings and postage dues (often with stamps from other countries, or Mulitas, Revenue stamps or postage-due markings), among the Mulitas mixed frankings (less than 50 known) is an extraordinary registered 70c cover with 5 Mulitas and two Aguilitas, this issue was the first Mexican issue with bicolor stamps and the collector assembled many very uncommon rates like Muestras sin Valor Commercial (Samples), parcel rates (3 receipts with attached stamps (maybe a handful of others are known) and printed matter (even one registered to Australia), most items are going abroad including rare destinations (Sweden, Norway, Hawaii, Canal Zone, Haiti, Denmark, Buenos Aires, Egypt, Turkey, Australia, Manila, Java, Honduras, Hong Kong, etc), there are 2 bisects (unlisted by Scott, but with a MEPSI opinion), other items include a 1c pasted on Zacatecas newspaper, an IOU with revenue stamps + Aguilitas and uncommon local city frankings, the high values chapter (50c-5p) contains 23 scarce items mostly non-philatelic including a tag originally attached to a bag, the highest franking cover (12 pesos: pair of 5p + 1p) is philatelic yet unique, not many off-cover stamps are included, yet there is a unique block with a very early "Payo Obispo" cancel (now Chetumal).

Examples of the white issue without embossing are believed to be from remainders found in the printing office at the time of Carranza - Villa break and are considered to be very rare.
