Grading and Condition

Proof

Superb Extraordinary item in the finest condition.

Extremely Fine Outstanding and exceptional quality.

Very Fine Choice, first-class condition.

Fine-Very Fine (F-VF) Stamp or cover in sound condition; if a stamp, it is slightly less well-centered than Very Fine but

better centered than Fine.

Fine Sound in all respects. Perforated stamps will have the designs clear of the perforations; the designs

of imperforate stamps will not be cut in to any significant degree.

Imperfect centering (stamps) or poor general appearance. Very Good (VG)

Any stamp faults such as a thin spot, tear, crease etc., will be described at all times. Postally used covers should be expected to have the normal degree of wear associated with them and this wear is not grounds for return. The grade of a cover is independent of the grade of the stamps on it. Covers from the famous Carroll-Hoy correspondence will normally have a small unobtrusive staple hole. In lots containing several items, degrees of condition denote the overwhelming average and examples above and below such condition can be expected.

Terms of Sale

Bidding

- I. All bids (whether by floor bidders, mail bidders, or telephone bidders) will have a premium of 18% added to the auction sale price.
- II. All bids are per lot as numbered in the catalog unless otherwise announced by the auctioneer at the time of sale. The right is reserved to withdraw any lot prior to sale, to divide a lot, or to group two or more lots, or to act on behalf of the seller. Schuyler Rumsey Philatelic Auctions, Inc. will execute bidding instructions on behalf of clients, but will not be responsible for any errors in the execution of such bids. Schuyler Rumsey Philatelic Auctions, Inc. is not liable for bidding errors related to live auction internet bidding and/or the loss of internet connection during the live auction.
- III. The highest bidder shall prevail; lots are sold at one increment over the second highest bid. Should any dispute arise between bidders, the decision of the auctioneer as to the successful bidder and the reoffering or resale of the lot under dispute shall rest entirely on the judgment of the auctioneer. The auctioneer shall regulate the bidding and reserve the right to refuse any bid believed by him not to be made in good faith.
- IV. Consignor has and retains the right to bid personally, or by his duly appointed agent, through the auctioneer, unless the sale is advertised and announced as one restricting such bidding by consignors or their agents.

Payments of Purchases

- V. FLOOR BIDDERS. Floor bidders shall furnish the auctioneer their names and addresses prior to bidding on any lot. The name and address of the buyer of each lot shall be registered with the auction house following the sale of each lot. Payment of the whole purchase price shall be made by the floor buyer in such manner as the auctioneer may determine. Special credit arrangements must be made prior to the sale.
- VI. MAIL BIDDERS. A successful mail bidder will be notified of lots purchased and must remit payment before the lots are sent. Auction bills are due and payable upon receipt of notification. If buyer's payment is not received within ten (10) days, Schuyler Rumsey Philatelic Auctions, Inc. may resell all lots without notice. Any and all losses incurred as a result of resale will be passed on to the defaulting buyer. Cost of postage, registration, etc. will be charged to buyer. Proof by the auctioneer of receipt of sending at the advised address shall constitute delivery.
- VII. DIRECT DRAFTS/TRANSFERS. A successful mail bidder known to us may contact our office at (415) 781-5127 for the information necessary to pay directly into the vendor bank account. Any additional charges resulting from processing payments by this method shall be borne by the buyer. Method of payment should be noted on the bid sheet.
- VIII. Title shall not pass to the buyer until full payment is received by Schuyler J. Rumsey Philatelic Auctions, Inc.
- IX. All of our lots are sold as genuine. Lots accompanied by recent (within 5 years of sale date) expert certificates are sold "as is" based on the description in the certificate. The aforementioned expertized lots may not be returned under any circumstances including those instances in which subsequent certificates yield conflicting opinions. The accepted authorities for U.S. stamps are the Philatelic Foundation (P.F.), the Philatelic Stamp Authentication and Grading, Inc. (P.S.A.G.) and the Professional Stamp Expertizing Committee (P.S.E.). In addition, a lot may not be returned because an expertizing service grades a stamp lower than the grade stated in the description, or differs from the accompanying certificate.

- X. The Auctioneer must be notified within 5 business days from the date of the auction of any request to place a lot on extension for expertizing. All extensions must be paid in full, in advance. There will be no exceptions and no lots may be returned under any circumstances if this term has not been strictly followed.
- XI. All lots on extension must be submitted for expertizing by the auctioneer exclusively. Each lot is sold as genuine, except those described "as is", but when, in the opinion of a competent authority acceptable to Schuyler J. Proof of the inability of said competent authority to express a definite opinion is not grounds for return of an item.
- XII. Any lot, description of which is incorrect, is returnable (A) within three (3) days of receipt and (B) if received by Schuyler J. Rumsey Philatelic Auctions, Inc. within twenty-one (21) days from the date of the auction. All disputed lots must be returned intact, in the condition received; no adjustments will be made. The following lots are not returnable: lots containing ten (10) or more items; lots from purchasers OR THEIR AGENTS who had the opportunity to examine them before the auction; items described as having defects or of a quality standard "Very Good" (V.G.) or below; lots with disputed centering or margins when the item is photographed; lots described "as is".
- XIII. JURISDICTION. 

Arkansas Territory 1819 - June 1836



2001	Arkansas, 8 June, manuscript postmark on folded letter sheet to Levant, Me., manuscript "25" rating (single letter rate for more than 400 miles), pencil notation on flap "dated Post of Arkansas A.T., Jun 5, 1826"; minor fly specking, Very Fine, one of seven covers reported from the Arkansas post office, the earliest from 1820.
	Estimate
	"Arkansas" was the name for the point 40 miles up the Arkansas River where the first dry land was found, established July 1, 1819. Name was later changed to Arkansas Post.
2002 🖂	Batesville A.T., Feby 9th, manuscript postmark on folded letter to Salem, Ky., with "3x" multiple of the 18½¢ rate (letter sent between 150-400 miles) totaling "55½"; allover toning and some vertical folds, Fine, one of the only examples known of the 18½¢ rate from Arkansas territory. Estimate
2003 🖂	Batesville, A.T., May 31st, manuscript postmark on folded letter datelined "May 10th, 1833, Territory of Arkansas" from William Woodruff to Robert Toland in Philadelphia, Pa., Very Fine and choice, this is one of ten reported Batesville covers from the Arkansas Territorial period. Estimate
	The addressee, Robert Toland, lived in Philadelphia and purchased many military bounty land patents for Arkansas Territory between 1820 and 1822. William E. Woodruff served as his agent in Arkansas, paying his taxes and administering the property from roughly 1825 until at least 1842. It is unlikely Toland ever traveled to Arkansas.
2004 🖂	Cant. Gibson, Feby 21st (Cherokee Nation), manuscript postmark with matching "Paid 25" rate on 1833 folded letter to Greenland, N.H., letter with mention of commander of fort General Matthew Arbuckle; cover with some extraneous ink spots, Very Fine. Estimate
2005 🖂	Fort Gibson, 19 Nov (Cherokee Nation), manuscript postmark on 1832 folded letter to Greenland, N.H., with matching Paid and "25" rate, enclosure signed by General Matthew Arbuckle, the commander stationed Fort Gibson, letter regarding the death of officer and arrangements being made to the return of the body; cover with some small edge nicks and tears at bottom, Very Fine. Estimate
	In 1827, the post office department put the area now in Eastern Oklahoma under the supervision of the Arkansas Postal Authorities. Fort Gibson was one of the first locations to receive a post office. The initial post office name was Cantonment Gibson, with both "Fort" and "Cantonment" designations used for several years. The Post Office Department officially changed the name to Fort Gibson on September 14th 1842.
2006 🖂	Helena A.T., April 24, manuscript postmark on 1833 folded letter sheet to Richmond, Va., manuscript "25" rate, Very Fine, a very scarce territorial postmark from Helena. Estimate
2007 🖂	Little Rock, 31 Oct, 1824, manuscript postmark with matching "Free, T.W. Newton, Postmaster" free frank on folded letter to Newport, R.I., letter written by postmaster and datelined "Genl. Land Agency, Little Rock A.T., 31st October 1824"; minor edge staining and small nick at top center, otherwise Very Fine. Estimate
	The Little Rock Post Office was established in May of 1820 with earliest cover reported on May 2, 1820. This is the first example to bear a Postmaster free frank from Little Rock.

Little Rock, Ark., Sept. 29, 1831, bold strike of fancy shield in semi-circle postmark on partially printed folded letter to Philadelphia, Pa. from the Toland correspondence, manuscript "Double 50" rate, enclosure datelined "Military Land Agency Office, Little Rock, Arkansas Territory, 26 Sept, 1831" regarding land taxes; file folds and some comer wear, still Very Fine, an attractive strike of this rare Little Rock, Arkansas fancy territorial date stamp; with 1993 P.F. certificate.

Estimate \$200 - 300

2014 ☑ Fort Gibson, Ark., Jun 22 (Cherokee Nation), cds on 1846 folded letter to Paymaster Genl. N. Towson in Washington D.C., with on Service notation and "10" rate; file folds one slightly affecting postmark, F.-V.F. Estimate \$150 - 200

Fort Towson in Choctaw Nation was named for General Towson

who was Paymaster General from early 1840's to 1854.

Fort Smith, Ark, Jun 7, cds on 1848 cover to street address in New Orleans, La., with manuscript "10" plus "2/12" total rate for the 10¢ single domestic rate plus 2¢ New Orleans carrier fee, with lengthy original enclosure with interesting content regarding Fort Smith including...I will try to describe how Fort Smith is situated. It is on the left bank of the Arkansas, separated by that river from the Cherokee Nation, and just at the line of the Choctaw Nation, the town is separated from the Garrison merely by a fence and stone wall., Very Fine, a rare Arkansas usage noting the 2¢ carrier fee in another state.

2017 Kidron, March 30 (Cherokee Nation), manuscript postmark with matching "5" rating on 1847 folded letter to Van Buren, Ark., letter dateline "Illinois Court House, March 29, 1847" with interesting content... I have just returned this day from Talhequah... I wish to consult you on would it be better to sell these Negroes for Warrants on the Nation (Indian Nation). I believe they would realise more in that way than any other way they could be disposed of for the reason that they are very unsaleable property in any Country, Very Fine, a very scarce Cherokee Nation postmark.

The Illinois Courthouse location is unclear but some documents list it as being at or near Fort Gibson.

2019 Napoleon Ark, Nov 4th, 1837, manuscript postmark on folded letter to Adelshofen, Baden, with matching "Paid 25" rate, with additional "via New York & Havre" routing endorsement, various manuscript ratings with French "Pays D'Outremer, Par Le Havre" framed handstamp and red crayon "50" kreuzer final due rating; cover edge wear and light band stain at center, F.-V.F., this being the earliest reported outgoing cover from Arkansas to a foreign country.

Holly Point, Ark, Feb 14, manuscript postmark on 1851 cover to New Orleans, La. from the Buchanan & Carroll correspondence, franked with ample to large margin 1847, 5¢ brown tied by manuscript cross cancel; cover with a few pinhole indicative of this correspondence, Very Fine, ex-Hart; with 1990 P.F. certificate.

THE ONLY KNOWN EXAMPLE OF THE 1847 5¢ ISSUE USED ON COVER FROM THE STATE OF ARKANSAS.



2026 Little Rock, Ark., Mar 26, blue cds on cover to Lynchburg, Va., franked with ample to large margin 1847, 10¢ black tied by matching blue circular grid handstamps; cover expertly restored at top left corner adding small portions of postmark, otherwise Very Fine, one of only four covers known with the 1847 10¢ issue used from Arkansas; with 1999 P.F. certificate.



2027 Little Rock, Ark, March 20, blue provisional handmade circular date stamp tying 1852, 1¢ blue, type IV, horizontal strip of three on cover to Drennon Springs, Ky., additional strike at right with manuscript date, with townmark made after fire destroyed the Little Rock post office on February 4th 1853, accompanied by second cover from correspondence franked with manuscript canceled 1851, 3¢ dull red (11) with manuscript "Little Rock, Ark, Feb 8" postmark four days after the fire and with enclosure mentioning the fire... Thursday night we were aroused from our slumbers by fire bells. Giffith's shop, Kinnard's shop, the post office and Roberson's store are in ruins.; former with doodling on stamps from recipient and latter with stamp corner nick, F.-V.F., this being one of two known on cover examples of the 1853 Little Rock Provisional date stamp. Accompanied by 2023 article "Fire destroyed the Little Rock Arkansas post office 4 Feb 1853. How did the postmaster cope?" by Bruce I. Roberts. 2028 🖂 Little Rock, Ark, Apr 3, perfect strike of blue cds canceling on 1855, 3¢ Nesbitt entire to Bowling Green, Ky., forwarded to Louisville with blue "Bowling Green, Ky., Apr 19" forwarding eds with matching "Forwarded" and "5" in circle handstamps, Very Fine and choice, an attractive forward usage. 2029 🖂 Napoleon, Ark., May 29, two bold strikes tying 1851, 1¢ blue, type II + 3¢ dull red + 10¢ green, type II, horizontal pair (7+11+14) on legal size cover to Plauen, Saxony, red "N. York U.S. Pkt., Paid 16, Jun 14" exchange cds and two strikes of blue Bremen transit handstamp; with pair of 10¢ stamps fallen off left of franking after transiting New York (N.Y. credit reflecting the proper 44¢ rate) and before reaching Bremen, cover edge tears and wear, Fine. Accompanied by 2024 Chronicle article "Something is Missing Here: Puzzling Out a Cover From Napoleon, Arkansas" regarding this cover by Bruce I. 2030 🖂 Tahlequah, Ark, Feb 28 (Cherokee Nation), cds with manuscript date tying 1857, 3¢ dull red, type III on cover to Fayetteville, Ark., reverse notes original enclosure was datelined "Tallahassee, Near Creek Agency" which no longer accompanies, Very Fine.

2033 🖂	Forest City, Vicksburg & Napoleon, U.S. Mail Packet, red oval handstamp on cover to Elcho, La., lack of postage and postal markings suggests this cover contained a bill of lading and thus transmitted free of postage charge, Very Fine and rare.
	Milgram No. unlisted
	Napoleon was a major transfer point at the mouth of the Arkansas River. Much of the river transported mail from the northern half of Arkansas passed onto the Mississippi River at Napoleon.
	The packet "Forest City", built in Brownsville, Pa. in 1851, is listed on the Vicksburg & Napoleon route (Star Route #8167) from August to December 1858 when the contract belonged to William Porterfield.
2034 🖂	Steamer Latona, red octagonal handstamp on 1852 folded letter from Pine Bluff, Ark. to New Orleans, La., entered the mails with red "New Orleans, La., Apr 16" cds with matching "Steam 5" in circle handstamp, Very Fine.
	Milgram No. 771
2035 🖂	Ouachita Packet New World, red oval handstamp on 1852 folded bill of lading from New Orleans, La. to Pigeon Hill, Ark. Very Fine. Milgram No. 1001. Estimate
2036 🖂	Arkansas Packets/Inland Waterway Cover Balance, exhibit balance of 11 covers; includes 5 manuscript packet endorsed entires, Mississippi river with "Belle Lee" and "Henry Ames", Arkansas & St, Francis rivers with "Geo. D. Palmer", "Quick Time" and "Des Arc", and 5 entires with packet handstamps from the Ouachita River with steamers including "Idahoe" (2 different), "Welcome", "Mayflower" and "Rapides"; condition varies with many nice strikes and covers throughout.

Carrollton, Ark., May 6th, manuscript postmark on legal size cover addressed to "Col. J.F. Snyder, Bolivar, Missouri", franked with manuscript canceled U.S. 1857, 1¢ blue, type V, horizontal strip of 6 (24), pencil 1861 year docketing on reverse; cover opening tear at top and right stamp with torn top corner, still Very Fine, Arkansas was an Independent State only for a short period between May 6th and May 17th of 1861.

A VERY RARE FIRST DAY ARKANSAS INDEPENDENT STATE USAGE AND UNIQUE MULTIPLE USAGE OF THE U.S. 1857 1¢ ISSUE.

According to the Walske-Trepel book, the southbound mails from the United States to western CSA was normally carried via Louisville and Tennessee until the June 7th U.S. postal discontinuance notice, which prohibited mail postal communications with the CSA. Mail on this route was diverted to the Unites States dead letter office in Washington D.C. At the dead letter office, the diverted mail was opened to ascertain the sender address, which was written on the face. The diverted letters were postmarked by the Dead Letter Office and handstamped with "Due 3 cts" straightline before returning to sender.





William H. Gist was a major in the 15th Reg't S.C.V. He enlisted on August 22, 1861 at 20 years old, for the duration of the war. He was the son of ex-S.C. Governor William Gist. He was promoted to Major on Oct. 19, 1861. He was killed in action on Nov. 18. 1863, near Knoxville, TN.

General Milledge Luke Bonham had been a US congressman who resigned after S.C. secession and became Commander in Chief of the S.C. Army with a rank of Major General. He served in coastal S.C. in" hearty cooperation with Gen'l Beauregard. He was later commissioned as Brigadier General in the Confederate Provisional Army and took the first (outside of Virginia) troops to Richmond to defend the capital. He fought in the Battle of Mannassas. After a disagreement with the War Dept. he resigned and was elected to the Confederate Congress. In Jan. 1865 he was appointed commander of a brigade, until the end of the war.

General Samuel McGowan was born on Oct 9, 1819. He studied law and was admitted to the bar in 1841. He served thirteen years in the State House of Representatives and was commended for gallantry in the Mexican War. In 1861 he was the S.C. major general in the state militia. He commanded a brigade at Fort Sumter in April 1861. In 1862 he was made colonel of the 14th South Carolina Infantry, and after the death of General Maxxy Gregg at Fredericksburg was promoted to brigadier general. He was wounded four times and serve until Appomattox where he was paroled in 1865. He later served in the S.C.

legislature and was an associate justice of the South Carolina Supreme Court. He died at his home in Abbeville in 1897 and is buried in Long Cane Cemetery.

Andrew Baxter Springs was a wealthy planter, with interests in railroads and banks. He was a signer of the Ordinance of Succession, and joined the military after the signing on Dec. 20, 1860. His rank, and the 3 cents rate, defines the date of this cover to be Jan. 26, 1861.

The "Millway Carrier" notation has always been somewhat of a mystery. Pre-war and CSA covers are both known with the "Millway Carrier" notation. "Millway" was also the name of a plantation in that area. The late Dick Krieger wrote a two-part article on the "Millway Carrier" notation which appeared in the May-June and July-August 1988 issues of the Confederate Philatelist. In his article, he outlines the very confusing mail routes in the Millway region of the Abbeville District and points out that the "Millway" notation is seen only on covers addressed to New Market, SC. New Market was a depot on the Greenville and Columbia Railroad some 15-20 miles distant from Millway. Neither New Market nor Millway appear on a current map of South Carolina. He further concluded that the notation was a routing instruction applied by the sender to make certain that the letters were carried on to Millway by the official government mail routes, thus this was not a private carrier service. There has been some speculation among SC Postal Historians that a slave from the plantation may have been used at least part of the time to bring the mail from New Market to Millway, but this remains as speculation and has not been proven.





Spartanburg, South Carolina, derives its name from the "Spartan Rifles", a militia group that served during the Revolutionary War. This name was later adopted by Confederate soldiers from Spartanburg during the Civil War.

Joseph Walker was appointed captain of the Spartan Rifles on April 13, 1861. Micah Jenkins, from Yorkville, South Carolina, was mustered into service as colonel of the 5th South Carolina Volunteer Infantry Regiment in June 1861.



With eight of her crew killed and many more wounded, USS "Isaac Smith" was forced to surrender.

Taken into Confederate Navy service under the name "Stono", she was wrecked near Fort Moultrie, S.C., while attempting to run the blockade of Charleston on 5 June 1863. The ship was loaded with cotton in an attempt to run the Union blockade on the night of June 5, 1863. The attempt proved disastrous, as the ship was discovered by Federal forces, and wrecked on a breakwater near Ft. Moultrie, trying to return to the harbor.

A CHOICE USE FROM ONE OF THE IMMORTAL 600 CONFEDERATE PRISONERS MOVED TO MORRIS ISLAND BY FEDERAL FORCES.

The "Immortal 600" was a group of 600 prisoners, all Confederate officers, moved from Fort Delaware to be sent to Morris Island in Charleston harbor in August 1864 and held in open barracks exposed to mortar fire from Confederate batteries.

This extraordinarily inhumane act was the Federal response to an equally repulsive act on the part of Confederates in Charleston, who exposed Union prisoners to bombardment from Federal forces within range of the city. This sorry chapter of the war ended in a stalemate in October 1864. Covers from Confederate prisoners imprisoned on Morris Island are very rare.

Jany II/65... My Dear FI...hasten to ans. yrs. just recd. Durg the smr mos. & again in Nov. I was more exposd thn you. A refugee frm N. Ga. removg to this neighd saw at Athns prisonrs taken frm a Raidg prty, who they special delivery were aimg to cros into Crolna, at my ferry. Tht party frm needls panic turned back whn they coud have disprt thruout the whole uppr portion of this state & not a gun woud have been flashed at them; there is no orgni. for defnce, altho it is so fully provn tht no frmg pop. will fight for their homes. Instead of bushwackg ea. one is occupied with tryg to save family & goods. Indeed for a long time, I did not expct to live to see Christmas, for at my time of life, & without descendants I do not propos to attmpt to take trouble to secrete person or effects. But now, the condition is reversed, for the immediate prsnt, & you shoul lose no time in comg here., the momnt Mrs. P. leaves for the West which she can easily reach. I know, authentically, that the Nav. off are courteous & do them obligly cross n comb. to othr side Miss. I doubt whether you coud get here, on wheels. Between us is tithe Depot & the urging to deliver has made the roads worse than I ever seen them. If you have the time, leavg Jennie to gain more strength, come on horse back to explore. This place, a noted one with its Mills & plainly in sight frm the ferry & the ford immediately below, may not eventually, be proper for vr. "valuables" or "papers" but I have 4 m. off a settlet. in a very secluded position, with a comfortable hse, good Ind, & c, which you are welcome to the use of, where you might put a few of the more valuable & trusty negroes. It woud be in. dispnsable, hwever, to bring up supplies of all sorts. Last yr's crop was the shortest ever made in this neighbrhd, & besides, the Govt. has pressed all provisions. You can do this by means of McCalla's boats constntly rung, frm the tithe Depot just above me, & retrng empty. In any event, my cottage is at yr. service & will affrd the requiste room. Before Shrmn took Atlanta I gave him Austa as well as Savnh. His success is disgraceful to the authrities civil & Mil. of both States. As a citzn of the Conf. I feel humiliated. He has the game in his own hnds. If our army makes a stnd at Adams run & covers the R. R. to Branchville, he will keep it in check with his main force while he dispatches a strong column to capture Augsta - detachmnts to scour this region at least as high as Andrsnville & to destroy all the R. Keepg aloof, frm misconceived dignity, he does not mingle suff. to be a good judge of Chrctr, hence he often makes bad appointmts & mistkg mulishness for firmness he adherences to them. An Important Jefferson Davis Free Frank Promoting Ulysses S. Grant to the Rank of Captain



Jefferson Davis, signature as Secretary of War on appointment form datelined "War Department, Washington Aug 9, 1853", promoting Ulysses S. Grant to the rank of Captain in the Fourth Regiment of the Infantry and to take affect on 5th of August, document addressed to "Captain U.S. Grant, 4th Infantry, Fort Vancouver, Washington Terr'y", with directive "You will proceed without delay to join your company (F) at Fort Humboldt, Cal.", reverse docketed "Rec'd Oct. 18/53", Very Fine.

A HISTORICAL APPOINTMENT OF ULYSSES S. GRANT TO THE RANK OF CAPTAIN ISSUED BY JEFFERSON DAVIS AS SECRETARY OF WAR.

Jefferson F. Davis was an American politician who served as the first and only president of the Confederate States from 1861 to 1865. He represented Mississippi in the United States Senate and the House of Representatives as a member of the Democratic Party before the American Civil War. He was the United States Secretary of War from 1853 to 1857.

Promoted to captain on August 5, 1853, Grant was assigned to command Company F, 4th Infantry, at the newly constructed Fort Humboldt in California. Grant arrived at Fort Humboldt on January 5, 1854, commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Robert C. Buchanan. Separated from his family, Grant began to drink. Colonel Buchanan reprimanded Grant for one drinking episode and told Grant to "resign or reform". Grant told Buchanan he would "resign if I don't reform". On Sunday, Grant was found influenced by alcohol, but not incapacitated, at his company's pay table. Keeping his pledge to Buchanan, Grant resigned, effective July 31, 1854. Buchanan endorsed Grant's resignation but did not submit any report that verified the incident. Grant did not face court-martial, and the War Department said: "Nothing stands against his good name". Grant said years later, "the vice of intemperance (drunkenness) had not a little to do with my decision to resign" With no means of support, Grant returned to St. Louis and reunited with his family.

Goliad Postmaster, John A. Clarke, was tired of customer complaints about the lack of stamps for sale. So he contacted the local newspaper the Goliad Messenger to print some for him. Newspaper owner, Rev. A.F. Cox, set the type and printed some very simple 5¢ and 10¢ stamps that are now among the rarest of all the world's postage stamps with only seven now known, including three on cover, to be in private hands.



AN EXTREMELY RARE USE OF A COVER CARRIED FROM NEW ORLEANS TO MOBILE BY THE LOUISIANA RELIEF COMMITTEE.

This cover was smuggled out of Union Occupied New Orleans with the postage paid by the committee and applied at Mobile. From the well known "Reynes" correspondence which was examined by Col. Jules Denis, CSA Provost Marshal at Mobile.

On May 31, 1863, the Louisiana Relief Committee came into existence, established by expatriate New Orleans residents residing in Mobile, Alabama. The committee aimed to ease the hardships faced by impoverished citizens who continued to live in U.S.-occupied New Orleans. Their efforts included organizing shipments of essential supplies, such as food and clothing to New Orleans. Additionally, they assisted citizens in relocating from New Orleans to the Confederate States.

During the 1850s, Jones was involved in development work on Navy weapons and served as ordnance officer on the new steam frigate "Merrimack" when she began active service in 1856.
	When Virginia left the Union in April 1861, Lieutenant Jones resigned his U.S. Navy commission, joining the Virginia Navy soon thereafter and becoming a Confederate Navy Lieutenant in June. In 1861-62, he was employed in converting the steam frigate "Merrimack" into an ironclad and was the ship's Executive Officer when she was commissioned as "CSS Virginia". When her Commanding Officer, Captain Franklin Buchanan, was wounded in the 8 March 1862 attack on "USS Cumberland" and "Congress", Jones temporarily took command, leading the ship during her historic engagement with "USS Monitor" on the following day.
	With the approach of the enemy troops, Norfolk was being evacuated. The "Virginia" could not be made light enough to go up the James River. To prevent its capture, the "Virginia" was run ashore in the bight of Carney Island and set afire. Later in 1862, he commanded a shore battery at Drewry's Bluff, on the James River, and the gunboat "Chattahoochee" while she was under construction at Columbus, Georgia.
	Promoted to the rank of Commander in April 1863, Jones was sent to Selma, Alabama, to take charge of the Ordnance Works there. For the rest of the Civil War, he supervised the manufacture of badly-needed heavy guns for the Confederate armed forces. With the end of the conflict in May 1865, Jones went into private business. After working in South America, he made his residence in Selma, where he was shot down on the streets of Selma, Alabama, June 29th, 1877, by a man whose child had had a fight with one of his children.

A RARE DOUBLE TRANS-MISSISSIPPI TURNED COVER WITH SECOND USAGE PAYING THE EAST TO WEST EXPRESS RATE.

The Mississippi River and inland waterway routes were essential lifelines within the Confederacy. Early in the war, Federal naval strategy focused on control of the Mississippi, and, by the spring of 1862, key port cities were captured by Federal forces, giving them control of the river. With the Southern states divided between East and West, the Confederate government was forced to devise special measures to maintain transportation and communication along the trans-Mississippi routes. Surreptitious traffic across the river was carried on by private and government couriers, and the post office was authorized to appoint agents to ensure that the mail lines remained open. In April 1863 the Confederate Congress authorized a "preferred mail" across the Mississippi River and established a 50¢ rate per half-ounce. The act was revised to create an "express mail" without a fixed rate of postage, but instead limited to no more than a dollar per half ounce. By October 1863, Postmaster General Reagan secured a contract to have mail carried across the Mississippi at the rate of 40¢ per half ounce. Meridian and Brandon, Mississippi, were chosen as the eastern terminal points. Shreveport and Alexandria, Louisiana, were chosen as the western terminal points.



Anderson was taken prisoner July 12, 1863 at the battle of Funkstown, Md. He was held prisoner at Funkstown and later transferred to Point Lookout, Md. on August 9, 1863.




William De Rosset resided in New Hanover County, N.C. when **appointed Major in the 3rd Regiment N.C. Infantry from May 16, 1861. Promoted to Lt. Colonel on April 26, 1862** (indicating this cover a 1861 usage) and to Colonel on July 1, 1862. Fought at the Seven Days Battles around Richmond, Va. and at Sharpsburg, Md. on September 17, 1862 where he was severely wounded and eventually resigned on Sept 7, 1863.

It includes many rare and unique prison usages, several which are featured in the definitive work *Prisoners' Mail From The American Civil War* by Galen Harrison. Belle Isle Prison

A POIGNANT ITEM FROM THIS VERY RARE CONFEDERATE PRISON.

Cover & letter sent by Cpl. Charles W. Fuller, 7th Wisconsin Cav., letter reads, "Dear Mother, I write these few lines to inform you that I am a prisoner and that my health is good. I am on Belle Island near Richmond. I hope you will not be curious about me. I expect we shall be paroled before long. I hope these few lines will find you well, as they have me. Write soon except my love, from your son Charles. P.S. Direct to C.W. Fuller, Co. E 7th Reg. W.V., Prisoner of War, Belle Island via Richmond, Va. Please send envelope and half sheet of paper."

Cpl. Charles W. Fuller, died at Andersonville Prison. Enclosed with the cover was a small scrap paper most probably written by his mother and preserved with his last letter home, "The past is the past is gone from us forever/Regrets and tears we find a like our vain/what fate decrees no mortal power can serve/the treasure lost can neer be ours again."

Belle Isle, a prison for enlisted men was established on this fifty-acre island located in the middle of the James River. The island was accessed by the old Richmond and Petersburg Railroad bridge from the Manchester side. Prisoners referred to the bridge as the "Bridge of Sighs". The prison was a six-acre enclosure surrounded by a four-foot high mound of dirt with a ditch on each side. The prison camp was situated on the lowest portion of the island. Cannon were placed on the high ground so as to overlook the enclosure. Tents were the only shelter, and at times as many as 10,000 were confined here.





Col. S.A. Moffett, 94th N.Y. Vols., obviously without postal markings, one to Col. A.R. Root, Commanding Post of Annapolis, other to his parents, *Illustrated on page 73*, "Prisoners' Mail From The American Civil War" by Galen Harrison.

ONLY 3 "BUTTON LETTERS" ARE KNOWN TO EXIST - AN EXTREMELY DESIRABLE PIECE OF HISTORY.

Transcriptions of letters included on Exhibition page. Also included is 1903 original transmittal cover sending the "Button Letter" to family in Ridgeland, Miss. and with notation "Father's Prison Letter".

Mail was smuggled into and out of prison by a variety of methods. One ingenious method was the "Button Letter". Union uniform buttons were of two piece metal construction. On occasion when an officer was being exchanged, a uniform button or buttons would be taken apart and a note written on a tiny scrap of paper which was then inserted into the button thus avoiding censorship.

A TOP RARITIES AS ONLY TWO COVERS ARE RECORDED FROM THIS PRISON.

The prison in Danville consisted of six tobacco warehouses plus a hospital. All were located in the center of town and as usual were most unpopular with local inhabitants. The Danville prisons were used from November 1863 through the end of the war.

Building #6 was a four-story brick tobacco factory at the southeast comer of Lynn and Loyal Streets. The first prisoners to occupy this building were those that had been moved from Building #2 so that building could be used to house the guards. Several prisoners from #6 took a parole to go out to work on fortifications. A number of these made an escape in this manner. Most were recaptured, while some few were able to make their way to Union lines.

Cpl. Chamberlin had been captured at the Mine explosion at Petersburg and was confined at Danville until February 20, 1865.

Camp Asylum was situated on the grounds of the former State Lunatic Asylum, near the Charlotte Railroad Depot. Surrounded by a high brick wall, it offered much better security than Camp Sorghum. General John H. Winder, the Commissary General of Prisoners, personally appealed to the Governor of South Carolina to repurpose the asylum grounds, citing the dire conditions at Camp Sorghum. Lt. John W. Austin, a prisoner there, noted in his diary that at least

500 officers had already escaped, with more fleeing each night.

City Point, situated on the James River, quickly took over from Aiken's Landing as an important exchange site. Officially named Camp Lewis, the prison comprised three large barracks, each enclosed by a tall wooden fence. Security was tight, with guards on constant patrol and sentries positioned to oversee the entire area. Inmates referred to Camp Lewis as the "Bull Pen." The sanitary conditions were inadequate, and prisoners claimed that spending a month there was worse than six months at Libby Prison. While it mainly served as a temporary stop for those awaiting parole or exchange, some provost marshal prisoners were held there for extended periods.

Letter with contents which include "We have a right hard time of it down here guarding the Yankee's, it is the (hardest) thing I ever did in my life to take a parcel of men half starved through a crowded city to please the eye or satisfy the appetites offered for sale and not allow them to buy one thing. We took back two thousand through the city the other day and some of them just begged me to let them buy something to eat but the officer in command told us if we let them buy anything they would put us in Castle Thunder and Court Martial us."





A UNIQUE ITEM SHOWING THAT IN RARE OCCASIONS PRISONER OF WAR COVERS WERE HANDLED IN BATCHES.



Unlike many Southern prisons, Camp Sorghum was not enclosed by a stockade. The move was so abrupt that there was no time to prepare the camp properly. Lacking a fence and guarded by a force of young boys and older men, security was insufficient, allowing hundreds of prisoners to escape.

On October 7th, approximately 1,200 prisoners were marched two miles along Augusta Road, across the Saluda River, to their new camp. The outbreak of yellow fever in Charleston achieved what Union General Foster had attempted but failed to do by placing 600 hostages on Morris Island: it led to the removal of Federal prisoners from the city.



Letter from Thaddeus A. Jones, a northern sympathizer, to his wife sending a long list of needs, including clothing, writing materials and soap. Directing her to send them "plainly to Room No. 10." Also included is an 1867 letter of recommendation for Thaddeus Jones from the Late President of the White Sulphur Springs Co. giving high praise and includes, "He was arrested during the war while attempting to remove to the North & was imprisoned a long time."

Castle Thunder opened in August 1862. Generally thought of as one building, Castle Thunder was actually a three-building complex. Greaner's Tobacco Warehouse and attached to either side were Palmer's Factory and Whitlock's Warehouse.

Captain George W. Alexander was in charge. When the war ended in 1865, there was public outcry at the treatment of Union prisoners held at Castle Thunder. In order to escape potential imprisonment, Alexander fled to Canada and then later returned in the 1870s.

In the beginning prisoners were segregated by type. Greaner's held Confederate deserters and disloyal citizens. Whitlock's held blacks and women. Federal deserters were placed in Palmer's Factory. As the war wore on and prison congestion became even more acute, these lines would blur.



Cover and letter from William Carr, a civilian hostage, who was captured as Confederate troops retreated from Gettysburg. Lengthy letter with religious content, "This I do know, that I am by far a better man since a prisoner that I was before God has shown me that the ways of the world are wicked." and signed "William Carr, Room No. 10".







Original enclosure datelined "Charleston Jail, August 2, 1864" appealing for clothing & supplies and reads in part "A supply of paper & envelopes would be particularly useful... Any other article which you think would serve to help us out (of) our miserable existence here would be thankfully rec'd. We hope upon our release to be able to return you all favors which may be shown us." and is signed, "In behalf of six officers",

Additionally included is 1864 cover with "U.S. Sanitary Commission, Department of the South" corner card imprint, franked with 1861 3¢ with "Port Royal, S.C. August 13, '64" double circle postmark, sent by James Hoadly, Sanitary Commissioner, Morris Island to his brother, the "State Librarian, Hartford, Conn.", original enclosure datelined "U.S. Sanitary Commission, Morris Island, August 6, 1864" reads in part, "You will also find a note from a Prisoner of War in Charleston Jail maybe you would like to save it. I have not been able to obtain any Rebel papers lately, but when I do will save them for you."

Pvt. George Riddell was captured Sept. 8, 1863 at the Battle of Sabine Pass aboard the U.S.S. Clifton. He was confined in the Old Court House at Houston, Tex.

His letter dated Sept. 11, 1863 was delivered by Flag of Truce to the **U.S.S. Cayuga**, Included is a photocopy of this letter from Riddell, that was submitted as part of his claim for a disability pension which was filed following the war.

The Deaf and Dumb Asylum was a second temporary facility which was utilized in Staunton in the form of a hospital for approximately 300 Federal wounded moved there following the "Battle of Piedmont" on June 5, 1864.

A Union surgeon, William Grumbein, himself a prisoner, was in charge from June to September of 1864. Grumbein was paroled to the limits of the town and thus was able to procure supplies for the men in the hospital. This letter from him was carried out by the mother of a wounded Confederate soldier, also in his care. In gratitude for caring for her son, the woman took Grumbein's letter to Martinsburg (West Virginia) to be mailed.

A large part of the letter includes, "It is one hour to sundown on the glorious 4th of July. I am a prisoner paroled but still in the hands of the enemy and must in all likelihood remain here a few months longer... I left Martinsburg on 1 June and marched to Piedmont upwards of 100 miles in 4 ½ days. Come up with Gen. Hunters Army on the 5th participated in the battle. We had about 100 killed & 500 wounded the next day. I and Dr. Owens were left in charge of the wounded at the field hospital. And the army moved on victorious to Stauton... My God! I thought I had seen work before in my life, but I never had, for two days & nights, my labors was incessant. I never thought of laying down to sleep. Most of the men lay out all night in the open air and in the scorching sun, I made shelter tents for them for temporary protection, and then worked there in the houses and barns. Took boards and laid them on the fences. While I was thus busily engaged, a squad of Rebels came and took everything I had... The morning after the battle about a dozen men, lay stiff in death and about as many more during that day. Oh, what misery! May I never see it again. Self was entirely forgotten... The battle was on Sunday, on Tuesday afternoon 34 ambulances came to fetch for Staunton. We loaded about 200 some here, fetched more afterwards and some still remain there under a few Rebel surgeons... When our army left Staunton, they left me in charge of 300 wounded men in the Deaf and Dumb Asylum. Work! Work!! and nothing but work. I sent all to Charlotteville except 125. We are all in the Confederate hands. Where our army is I do not know. I3 men have died for me. One will die tonight and perhaps five or six more. I cut off many an arm and leg for the last month... The rebels are not as near whipped as you at home think, they are the fight like tigers. I have got lice, bedbugs and the itch. Mrs. Brown from Winchester has a son in the rebel service wounded here, she will take this letter to Martinsburg for me."

Sender says send letter "By Flag of Truce" unsealed and direct them to "Wm. Grumbein, Asst Surg., 20th Pa. Cav., In Charge of Wounded Federals, Staunton, Va.".



THIS IS THE ONLY RECORDED EXAMPLE OF A COVER FROM THE FAIR GROUNDS PRISON.

Fair Grounds, often called the "Race Track," was the site of a stockade constructed on the former Fair Grounds property. In September 1864, around 5,000 prisoners were transferred here from Andersonville. The prisoners had access to a hospital located at one corner of the grounds, and the Sisters of Mercy played a vital role in providing food and clothing. Diary entries from inmates commend the sisters for their unwavering attention to their needs. The facility was commanded by Colonel John F. Iverson of the 5th Georgia Volunteers. Robert H. Kellogg noted in his diary that prisoners were removed on October 8th due to a yellow fever outbreak in Charleston.



ACCORDING TO HARRISON THIS IS ONE OF ONLY TWO RECORDED USAGES - A WONDERFUL AND HISTORIC ITEM.

Written on board the Flag of Truce boat, the "New York", a small side-wheel steamer which was used extensively on the James River to transport prisoners both to and from the exchange point. On the trip from Aiken's landing back up to Fort Monroe or Annapolis, the released prisoners were in effect aboard a floating parole camp. The "New York" also carried mail to be exchanged. Not only was mail carried aboard the steamer, but in some cases mail was generated aboard the vessel. Proof of this is a letter headed "On Board Yankee Flag of Truce Boat Sep. 2 1864".

Captain Zabdial Boyleston Adams, 56th Mass. Volunteers (Colored), had that day been released from Libby Prison. Understandably bitter at this point, he wrote, "I have suffered much, but shall fight until I am killed or utterly disabled, I owe the rebels a long debt of wrongs, injuries and cruelties inflicted on our men". He was released on parole and was on his way to Annapolis, Md.

Gilmore escaped from the camp hospital on Oct. 4th and was twice recaptured before reaching New Bern, N.C.

Florence was built primarily to ease the crowded facility at Andersonville. On September 17, 1864, some 6,000 prisoners arrived from Charleston. At the time of their arrival, the stockade walls were less than half finished, and these first prisoners were guarded in an open field. By mid-October 1864 over 12,000 prisoners were here. The guard force was made up of about 150 militiamen, mostly old men and young boys. Many were unarmed, those that were, were armed with single or double barrel shotguns.

The death rate at Florence was high, largely due to the physical condition in which the majority of prisoners here arrived. Most came here after several months in Andersonville. The Federal government sent clothing, shoes, and hats to the prisoners though a flag of truce. A great deal of suffering was caused by a lack of medical supplies, cooking utensils, and fresh vegetables. Additionally the prisoners had no shelter except what they could provide themselves. As they had at Andersonville, many built shebangs or burrowed into the ground.

Severely wounded prisoners were cared for at what was usually called the General Hospital. This was General Hospital Number 1, the former City Alms House. Prisoners whose wounds were not so serious were treated at Ligons Warehouse.

Large numbers of the Federal wounded from First Manassas were treated here. Dr. Charles Bell Gibson was in charge. He was assisted in treating wounded prisoners by Union surgeons who had also been captured at Manassas.



General Hospital #1, Richmond, Va., folded letter with content to Brooklyn, N.Y., datelined "Richmond Aug. 22, 61", manuscript "Soldiers Letter" and blue manuscript "3", postmarked "Washington, D.C. We get the paper every day, taking all things in consideration I rather prefer being a Prisoner, than a soldier in the field.", and ends with, "I hope these few lines will reach you and if so I wish you would write, direct General Hospital Richmond (care) Gen Winder, Per Adams Express", some re-enforced (hinges) splits along folds, Very Fine, a wonderful item with excellent content, Illustrated on page 89, "Prisoners' Mail From The American Civil War" by Galen Harrison.

A VERY EARLY SOUTH TO NORTH PRISONER OF WAR USAGE FROM PVT. ALFRED COPLEY TO HIS PARENTS - ONLY 9 KNOWN.

Sgt. Timmons, 1st Ohio Inf. died Sept 16 and Andersonville of ulcers. The letters written by Timmons are housed in the Duke University Library.

Coplin was wounded and captured at Chicamauga and treated at Hospital #21 in Richmond. Coplin was the first man shot and killed in the "Deadline" in Andersonville Prison on April 10, 1864. Inside Andersonville Prison, about 19 feet from the wall, was the "deadline", which was intended to prevent prisoners from climbing over the stockade or from tunneling under it.

The playbill is dated Christmas Eve, "Thursday Evening, December 24th, 1863" and sender appears on playbill for a Violin and Flute Duet. (Lt. Rockwell).



After the war, Wirz was tried and executed for conspiracy and murder relating to his command of Andersonville; this made him the highest-ranking soldier and only officer of the Confederate Army to be sentenced to death for crimes during their service.



Located on the comer of 25th & Cary Streets, this facility opened October 25, 1861 to accept a portion of the Ball's Bluff prisoners, some reports say as many as 500. In early December, a number of prisoners were moved from here to Taylor's Warehouse. At the end of March 1862, the building ceased operations as a prison. Later, however, the building was used as General Hospital #21, which would become the largest prison hospital in the city.

Clark C. Knowlton and Pvt. Isaac Newton Jones (see Lot 3154) both men were captured members of Dahlgren Raiders and held in the Pemberton Building.

John Ransom's diary described how they were marched to Richmond and quartered on the third floor of Pemberton's prison, "not 30 rods from the Libby building".

The prison in Danville consisted of six tobacco warehouses plus a hospital. All were located in the center of town and as usual were most unpopular with local inhabitants. The Danville prisons were used from November 1863 through the end of the war.

At a distance of about six blocks from Building #6 was located the prison hospital. Although few medicines were available in the South, due to the blockade, at least during cold weather, prisoners in the hospital had heat. Bunks were also provided for sick patients, whereas almost all the other prisoners slept on the bare floor. The hospital had been built as a Confederate hospital, but necessity had transformed it into a hospital for the prisoners.





Antrim writes in his book, "From a prisoner in Columbia, S.C. early in the war, January 27, 1862. Only four prisoners' covers are known used with the 5¢ green lithographed stamp. The Yankees tried to tear off the "Rebel" stamp; this was quite often done in the early part of the war.".

Richland Jail served as the main county jail for Richland County, located near downtown Columbia. This three-story brick building was the first prison established in the city. Unfortunately, it, like much of Columbia, was destroyed by fire when Sherman's army entered in February 1865. The jail had been in use for prisoners as early as January 1, 1862, under the command of Captain Shiver. Initially, inmates were treated fairly well, sometimes attending lodge meetings or dining at fine restaurants. However, this changed when Captain Rufus D. Senn took charge of the Columbia prisons, adopting a much more businesslike approach. By the time Sherman arrived in Columbia on February 17, 1865, the jail was still operational, as indicated by Sherman's official report referencing "the officers who had long been imprisoned there and rescued by us."





Letter with interesting content, "This building is occupied by a large number of officers on parole, we are confined to the building and grounds around. I have been here only since Monday last, I was in the jail yard for 10 days previous ... I gave a man here (a broker, blockade runner or both) a draft on you for twenty dollars in gold, he giving me one hundred dollars in Confederate money. We all acknowledged it to be a swindle but needed the money bad enough to be cheated considerable. There is a rumor tonight that we are to be moved into the country." The letter goes on requesting clothing and food staples.


Theodore F. Whitney was one of those unfortunates. Letter to his mother includes the following, "You will see by the heading of this letter (Richmond, Va.) that the fortunes of war has made your Babe Son a prisoner of war. I was captured Sept. 19th at the Battle of Chickamauga" Whitney went on to list several other prisoners he thought his mother would know.



Letter written in pencil by Cpl. David Smith, 2nd Ohio Inf. and datelined "Richmond, Virginia Dec. 2nd, 1863", who writes, "I take my pen in hand to drop you a few lines. I am well and a prisoner in Camp Libby Prison, we are kept in a large brick building... I see no prospect of getting away from here before spring, the Boys are all getting boxes of grub from home... I have no other paper but this and no envelopes." and concludes by giving his address as "Fourth Floor, Smith's Factory Camp, Libby Prison, Richmond Virginia"

Smith's Prison a small warehouse across the street from Scott's Prison and was a part of the Libby Prison complex.



A plank fence about 15 feet high extended around the enclosure. Officers were kept in a separate enclosure from enlisted men. The prisoners' only shelter consisted of tents.
